Ostara occurs during the point of balance when day and night are of equal length, before tipping into the return of the sun. In Celtic tradition we celebrate the Spring Maiden and Horned God during this time and ask that they bestow us with abundance, fertility and new beginnings throughout the year. Perform your own ritual by planting a few seeds and caring for them as they grow.

t 32 years old,
Melissa could pass

Melissa is no stranger to self-empowerment, having begun life in a Sri Lankan convent, before being adopted at eight weeks old and raised in East Anglia.

Thousands of miles from her birthplace, Melissa's only link to her biological family was an old photo and a piece of paper with her mother's name on it.

Then in 2009, at a Sri Lankan slum plantation, Melissa was reunited with her birth mother who had kept a copy of that very same photo.

Family connection

'Since then, my focus has been the plight of the Tamil tea plantation workers of Sri Lanka and finding ways to alleviate their poverty,' Melissa says.

Melissa's business success enables her to send money to the plantations, as well as contributing £58,000 to charity Tea Leaf Vision, which provides education to the children of plantation workers.

She has also set up a direct tea trade, as part of her brand 'Niroshini', dealing directly with her brothers who work on a small plantation, with all profits going to the plantation community.
